Assembly Bill 130

- Education finance bill
- Signed into law on July 9, 2021
- Requires public schools, county offices of education, and charter schools provide two meals (breakfast and lunch) each school day to all students who want one, regardless of their free or reduced-price meal eligibility.
- Goes into effect 2022-2023 school year



Benefits of Universal School Meals

Reduced food insecurity

- Help families stretch food dollars
- Reduce stigma students may feel

Improved academics

- Improved reading and math scores
- Improved likelihood of moving to next grade on time

Improved behavior

 Reduced disciplinary referrals and suspensions

Three Key Pillars

Pillar One:

California's State

Pillar Two:

Pillar Three:

The California State Legislature allocates funds to provide additional state meal reimbursement to cover the cost of the Universal Meals Program.

Pillar One

California's State Meal Mandate is expanded to include both a nutritiously adequate breakfast and lunch for, not just needy children, but all children each school day.







Pillar Two

High poverty schools will be required to participate in a federal provision.







Definition of "High Poverty Schools"

- Identified Student Percentage (ISP) of 40 percent or more
- 40 percent of students fall into one of these categories:

Directly Certified

- CalFresh, MediCal/Medicaid
- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), or
- Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservation (FDPIR)



Student identified as

- Homeless, migrant, foster, or runaway
- Participating in Head Start or similar program

Federal Provisions

- Existing federal programs
 - Use data during a base year to establish reimbursement percentages for the site, after which the site can provide meals to all for the next three years
 - Reduces administrative burden
- Two main provisions
 - Provision 2 Uses Free and Reduced Price Meal (FRPM) applications
 - Community Eligible Provision uses ISP



Pillar Three

The California State Legislature allocates funds to provide additional state meal reimbursement to cover the cost of the Universal Meals Program








Supplements National School Lunch and Breakfast Program Reimbursement

- Requires participation in National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs to receive state reimbursement
- Intention is to maximize federal reimbursement
- State will provide a supplemental reimbursement

Potential Impacts and Opportunities



Potential Impacts to School Food Service Partners

- Those that don't currently have breakfast programs will need to start one
- High-Poverty Schools or districts that don't currently participate in CEP or Provision 2 will need to apply for one of these programs
- More schools may opt to participate in Provision 2
- Universal Meals may result in increased participation
- Food waste may increase



Potential Impacts to Our Work

- May impact qualifying sites for services if more schools participate in CEP
 - Many sites already utilize Community Eligibility Provision
- Federal Free and Reduced-Price Meal applications will need to be collected by those not participating in CEP
 - Provision 2 schools will collect FRPM applications during base years
- Where eligibility is considered there is no change in how sites will be qualified to participate in our program



Potential Opportunities to Support School Food Service Partners

- Smarter Lunchrooms Movement
- School gardens and nutrition education that connects to foods served in the cafeteria
- Youth engagement
- Kitchen Infrastructure and Training Funding
 - Schools can receive funds for training on promoting nutritious meals, including healthy food marketing and the school meal environment

Main Takeaways

- Schools will still participate in the Federal NSLP and SBP and will need to collect FRPM applications
- Universal School Meals will not change how sites are qualified to participate in our program
- Eligible sites must be certified on the CDE <u>Student Poverty</u> -<u>FRPM Data</u> and meet at least 50% or more of the total enrollment for FRPM, or be qualified as a CEP
- We can help support our school food service partners with nutrition education and PSE change support
